Work in Progress



- The Judicial Way □ Solidarity has conceptualised in status-quo, but properly implemented.
- CJEU on interstate solidarity:
 - Joined Cases C-643/15 and C-647/15
 - Joined Cases C-715/17, C-718/17 and C-719/17
- CJEU on «solidarity» towards TCN \square *N.S. case* and subsequent caselaw.
- 2. The **Legislative Way** □ New conceptualisation of solidarity



Solidarity as Sharing of Derogations and Flexibility

- New Pact and Instrumentalisation Toolbox
- Solidarity as:
 - Purely interstate
 - *Laissez-faire* regime
- EU Solidarity:
 - Flexible (yet mandatory)
 - Emergency-based
- Securitization and othering of migrants





Solidarity as Sharing of Agency



- Ukraine model
- Sharing of **agency**: involvement of TCNs in decision-making
- Sharing of operations: Solidarity
 Platform
- Political will
- Legal Flexibility



Policy Proposal

- Wished endpoint
- Sharing of Agency = **model** for implementing the solidarity principle in the EU migration policy
 - Standardisation outside crisis situations
 - Key elements: political will + legal flexibility + accountability
- Win Win model
 - Better responsibility sharing among Member States
 - Solidarity towards TCNs
